Summary:

The event began with an inaugural address delivered by the Principal, Dr. Indranil Kar, followed by the words of inspiration by the IQAC Coordinator, Dr. Suchandra Chatterjee. The Head of the Department, Dr. Shayeari Dutta then introduced the esteemed speaker to the audience.

The lecture focussed on the technical aspect of adapting a narrative text into the medium of film by using the example of the 1982 Pulitzer-winning novel by Alice Walker, *The Colour Purple*, and its subsequent adaptation by director Steven Spielberg in 1985. In her lecture the speaker introduced the participants, mostly undergraduate English literature students, to the theory and practice of adaptation not only as a technical process of translation or transference, but as something more complex and elaborate, where the essence of the text is altered in diverse ways while not being entirely lost. The speaker subsequently established the intricate relationship between the verbal text and the visual text where the shift from verbal symbolism to the visual power of the cinema referred to the dynamic possibilities of Walker's novel. The participants were introduced to certain key scenes from the film which were then juxtaposed with key narrative sections in the novel in order to drive home the potency of colour in a text predicated on the African-American experience. Towards the end of her lecture, the speaker invited questions and observations from the participants and a lively discussion followed.

The event was brought to a conclusion with a Vote of Thanks offered by a faculty of the Department of English, Madhulina Bauri.
